Personally, I have stopped waiting for when this pandemic will be over and instead, reframed my view to how we live through and during a time of pandemic. A congregational vote was held and the decision was made - to dispose of the building, with the hope and wish that it will be resurrected as something new. And to dare to be a Worshipping Community without a building.

Hear me very clearly when I say this ... the Congregation of Knox United did not fail. We are not dead. We are taking a bold step in living what we have learned that Church is NOT the sticks and bricks, it is the people inside it.

Christ Church is looking forward to welcoming our brothers and sisters from Knox United. We have been worshipping together for 19 months, at first online only, and recently in our buildings. We have developed a Sunday routine of first and third Sunday's as United Church Worship and second and fourth Sunday's as Anglican Church Worship.

Every Wednesday there is a Saint's Day Worship at Christ Church. And as we continue to walk through the pandemic, and dare to dream of what will come, we are learning blended Church with people in attendance and joining us online. I have learned that a virtual community is indeed a community and we are much richer for our brothers and sisters who join us from British Columbia, Ontario, Alberta, Montana, Texas, Florida and our beloved Ida who faithfully joins us from England. We wouldn't be who we are as a Worshipping Community without each other.

So, here's the thing. Even though we do a great deal online, our Parish expenses continue...the biggest one being my stipend. I don't like to talk about money, but the reality is, without it, we can't continue. We can't pay the electric bill, the gas bill, the tithes to our Regional and Diocesan offices, and we can't pay for ministry.

We have so much for which to be grateful. We live in a beautiful part of the world. We have accessibility to a vaccine which has enabled us to join again with our parishioners at Rocky Mountain Village, and hopefully soon, our parishioners at Trinity Lodge (in person).

I am so grateful for each and every one of you. I hold you in my prayers and I know you keep me in yours. Please continue to pray for the Parish. Pray for each other at Knox United and Christ Church. Pray for Archbishop Lynne and our Regional Minister Kathy Davies. Pray for me, your Incumbent, and please, pray for yourselves.
